# **MBCW Publishes Its First** Research Study

After six years of hard work and dedication, approximately 300 Marin County women Marin Breast Cancer Watch (MBCW) has published the results from its first research project, the Adolescent Risk Factors Study (ARFS). The results can be found in the scientific journal Breast Cancer Research. or online at: http://breast-cancerresearch.com/content/5/4/R88.

The Adolescent Risk Factors Study was designed to understand if adolescent and pre-adolescent exposures and experiences differ between women with and without breast cancer in Marin County. Completion of the study marks the conclusion of the first community-based research study in the Bay Area to look at breast cancer.

"This is an important step forward because it shows that the community can not only be a part of the research process, but be part of helping find the causes of breast cancer," said Janice Barlow, executive director of MBCW. "Publication of this study is just one more piece of the puzzle as we try to understand what is causing breast cancer."

In 1997, members of Marin Breast Cancer Watch sought assistance from researchers and scientists to help them better understand the causes of breast cancer in Marin, Dr. Margaret Wrensch, PhD, a professor of epidemiology and biostatistics at the University of California, San Francisco, answered the call and helped the community organization devise the Adolescent Risk Factors Study. At the time, there was very little research into how the experiences of adolescents might affect their chances of getting breast cancer religion. later in life.

Trained volunteers interviewed diagnosed between July 1, 1997 and June 30, 1999 with breast cancer (cases), and 300 Marin County women without breast cancer (controls), matched for age and ethnicity.

# Resulting Similarities

Results of the study found striking similarities between the cases and controls as well as several differences that were significant. Lifetime number of years lived in Marin was 24.2 years for both groups, and the mean age first lived in Marin was 28.8 for controls and 29.6 for cases. Other factors that were not significantly different between cases and controls included: having a first degree relative with breast cancer (20 percent of controls and 18 percent of cases); history of non-cancerous breast biopsy; current socioeconomic status; age of first period; age at first birth or pregnancy (mean of 25.1 for controls and 25.3 for cases); use of hormone replacement therapy; height; health insurance status and frequency of pelvic exams and pap tests.

# Resulting Differences

Significant differences were noted in other factors. Cases were more likely than controls to report: a high socioeconomic status before the age of 21; four or more mammograms in 1990-1994; giving birth without breast feeding; being premenopausal; never having used birth control pills; having a lower highest body mass index; beginning drinking after age 21; drinking on average two or more drinks per day and being raised in an organized

# **MBCW Receives** \$10,000 to Begin **Adolescent Program**

Marin Breast Cancer Watch received a grant from the Marin Breast Cancer Council to create a new education program aimed at adolescent girls in the community.

The \$10,000 grant will help fund the "Adolescent Breast Cancer Prevention, Risk Reduction and Education Project." This project will take the information learned from the Adolescent Risk Factors Study and results from other adolescent breast cancer studies and create an education program that gives young girls the information and tools they need to make informed decisions about their health.

Janice Barlow, executive director of Marin Breast Cancer Watch, said the program is currently being developed and interested members of the community are welcome to participate in the process. The first step in creating the program will be to conduct a community-wide assessment about the current level of health

Our success is a result of the outpouring of support we receive from businesses, community members, elected officials and the many volunteers who help with our research and events.

I am proud to give the following mid-year report, detailing the continued success and growth of Marin Breast Cancer Watch. Thus far in 2003 we:

- Joined a broad coalition of Bay Area researchers, scientists and community organizations to submit a proposal to the National Institutes of Environmental Health Sciences to create a Research Center of Excellence on breast cancer and the environment.
- Completed and published our first research study, the Adolescent Risk Factors Study. ARFS was the first community-based research project in Marin County to look at breast cancer.
- Finished two other research studies, the Marin Environmental Data Study and the Personal Environmental Risk Factors Study.
- Received a \$100,000 grant from the Avon Foundation to continue conducting important community-based research projects, educating the community and advocating on behalf of policies that help us find the causes of breast cancer.
- Hosted the fourth annual Honor Thy Healer event, the largest and most successful in the organization's history
- Created and hosted a Gala Event, with live and silent auctions, to raise money for the organization.
- Received a \$10,000 grant from the Marin Breast Cancer Council to begin development of an Adolescent Breast Cancer Prevention, Risk Reduction and Education Project.

- Continued to receive positive media coverage about the important work we are doing on breast cancer research and education.
- Brought on new board members with a broad range of skills and experiences.
- Implemented a \$12,000 grant from the Marin Community Foundation to update our financial accounting system.
- Hosted an epidemiology workshop to help Marin residents better understand research in the community.
- Hosted a community education forum with Dr. Leslie Bernstein and Peggy Reynolds to discuss the California Teachers Study.

# **Update on Marin Breast Cancer** Rates

The rate of breast cancer in Marin County continues to be an issue that worries many women. When the most recent rates were announced in January 2002, a 20 percent increase over the previous year was reported. This sparked outrage and concern throughout the community and rightfully so.

The good news is that the strong reaction spurred by media reports and community response helped to focus resources on important research. It also made elected officials keenly aware of the need to do more to find the causes of breast cancer.

When the rates were announced last January, they were calculated using the best available data, which at that time were the 1990 census figures. Researchers anticipated that the rate2 would be lower when more current census figures were used. They also projected that the population of women between the age of 45 and 64 living in Marin might be underrepresented in the denominators.

Recently, the National Cancer Institute (NCI) recalculated the rates using 2000 census estimates and determined that breast cancer rates in Marin County are in fact lower than originally thought.

It's important to understand, the figures that were released last year were not a mistake. Researchers used the best available data at the time-from the 1990 census.

The recently released NCI figures were preliminary. In late June, the Northern California Cancer Center will conduct a more comprehensive evaluation and recalculate breast cancer rates for Marin County. There are two different sets of figures from which to derive a denominator in order to establish breast cancer rates: the census estimates and figures from the State Department of Finance, which will be available in June.

The finance figures are more comprehensive and allow for the inclusion of the role of migration.

the fact of the matter is incidence and mortality rates in Marin County, as well as the Bay Area, are still simply too high. There are too many women being diagnosed and dying from breast cancer. Whether or not the rates go up or down is really unimportant. One new woman diagnosed with breast cancer in Marin County is one too many.

# Marin **Environmental Data Study Complete**

Marin Breast Cancer Watch recently completed work on the Marin Environmental Data Study (MEDS), a pilot project designed to help set the foundation for a community-specific database. The project investigated community concerns about environmental problems that may relate to breast cancer in Marin and identified existing datasets that may be used to address these concerns.

By identifying datasets with Marinspecific environmental data, the MEDS pilot project facilitates the development of future research studies designed to investigate the extent environmental factors may be contributing to Marin County's high rates of breast cancer.

Although the primary goal of MEDS was to inform future research, we believe the databases can serve our community in other important ways. For example, the information contained in the datasets can be used to:

- Assess current environmental conditions of our community.
- Observe trends in environmental conditions that forecast future problems.
- Identify environmental conditions that require attention and research.
- Facilitate changes in public policy.

The following datasets were selected for inclusion in MEDS because they contain Marin-specific information While all of this has been confusing, and are easy to access through search engines such as Google and Yahoo:

education in Marin County with regard to health risk, adolescent health and breast cancer. MBCW will host a series of focus groups with young girls and mothers to learn where breast cancer fits into the agenda of teenage girls. Finally, an evaluation of other programs around the country will be made to determine tools and information that may be helpful in constructing an ongoing educational program in Marin.

"The idea for this program came from discussions with women in the community who want to make sure their daughters have information about breast cancer and health," Barlow said. "There is a real need to not only inform, but to work with young people to better understand their concerns and ideas."

Working with health care professionals, educators, young girls and others from the community, Marin Breast Cancer Watch hopes to create a pilot program that can be a model for other communities.

# **MBCW Publishes Its First Research Study**

Continued from page 1

The similarities between cases and controls in this study and the high incidence of some breast cancer risk factors that were found in many areas, suggest that both groups are at high risk for breast cancer. Specific findings, in combination with the results of other recent prospective studies, suggest that decreased alcohol consumption and increased breastfeeding after childbirth — modifiable risk factors in adults — might help to reduce breast cancer risk.

"This research project was initiated because of community concerns." Barlow continued. "Early in the process, community meetings were held to help focus research direction and techniques. At every step in the process, MBCW research members have played an active role."

The principal investigators on the study were Margaret Wrensch, PhD, and Georgianna Farren, MD, representing Marin Breast Cancer Watch.

The focus on community-based research as a model has established Marin Breast Cancer Watch as a leading advocate for the inclusion of community concerns and ideas in research projects.
